Annex 3: Foodborne or Illness Response

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I. Introduction

- A. Food emergencies may be caused by biological/chemical contamination, natural disasters or intentional acts of sabotage and terrorism (e.g., bioterroism or agroterrorism).
- B. The Tuolumne County Public Health Department and Environmental Health Departments share responsibility for a local investigation of a food emergency. Additionally, law enforcement may be involved if intentional contamination is suspected.
- C. Any investigation would be coordinated with the CDPH (California Department of Public Health) Food and Drug Branch (FDB), as well as multiple State and Federal agencies that regulate wholesale, processed and imported foods as indicated by the situation. (Contact information, see V.)
- E. During emergency system activations, all resources, including State and federal assets, should be requested in accordance with Standardized Emergency Management System and the resource management request process in the HEPReP (Resource Management Section).

II. Activation of Emergency Response

- A. The Public Health Local Health Officer (LHO) in response to local healthcare organization reporting, determines the need to initiate an Department Operations Center (DOC) in collaboration with Tuolumne County Office of Emergency Services (OES). The LHO assumes Incident Command and is the designated Medical Health Operational Area Coordinator (MHOAC).
- B. Triggers considered to initiate a Foodborne Illness DOC include:
 - 1. An unusual or unexpected pattern of gastroenteritis, which is identified via day to day surveillance and/or normal reporting processes
 - 2. A rapid increase of incidence as evidenced by medical surge that impacts the local healthcare system
 - 3. Information received from other local Health Departments, CDPH or the CDC that requires a local investigation or response
- C. Reporting a confirmed foodborne event is required by the State of California Department of Public Health. The Confidentiality Morbidity Report CDPH form 110a is submitted.
 - Page 2 of the CMR of reportable diseases includes:

 - D. The Environmental Health Department participates with Public Health in the Department Operations Center in defining case criteria and completing investigations.
 - E. The Incident Commander ensures local, region and State authorities are notified of the initiation of the DOC in response to the foodborne illness event.
 - F. Local response partners are notified by the California Health Alert
 Network System (CAHAN) of a medical and/or health emergency. An additional
 communication method may be utilized based on message recipient's
 confirmation of the alert. Back up communications include a phone call and
 fax. (Refer to HEPReP Section 5, Communications Plan)
 - F. The Tuolumne County Office of Emergency Services supports the Health Department DOC with resources and integration of other County departments as needed such as law enforcement, communications and transportation.

IV. Health Care Organization Roles and Responsibilities

- A. During day-to-day patient care delivery, report per regulatory statute. When an unusual or suspicious event occurs, report to the Medical Health Operational Area Coordinator (MHOAC), for early local notification and collaboration in community response.
 - Healthcare agencies and providers may call the Health Department with any
 questions or concerns regarding foodborne illness. The Health Officer will
 determine if event is managed as 'day-to-day' or as an unusual or emergency
 event.
 - Healthcare Organization reporters may utilize the EM Resource electronic reporting system or the Health Care Situation Report/Resource Request (MHOAC) form submitted by fax. Follow with a confirmation phone call for an urgent situation. This method is also used during an event to update Operational status of the facility/agency.
- B. Protect staff and patients by following guidance as provided from the Health Officer, CDPH or the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).
- C. Contribute and participate in coordinated risk communication strategies with the public.
- D. Respond to requests from the MHOAC, such as:
 - 1. Resource or inventory requests

- 2. Operational status
- E. Attend briefings and/or participate in the Multi-Agency-Coordinating (MAC) process



Attachment 1: Public Health Actions in the Event of a Food Recall

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- Step 1. The Health Officer and/or the Director of Environmental Health (EH) receives a food recall alert
- Step 2: The Health Officer consults with the Director of EH to determine roles and responsibilities
- Step 3: The local food supplies, such as grocery stores or restaurants are contacted by phone or visit to ensure the food recall has been received and/or actions taken as directed.
- Step 4: Documentation of actions taken is maintained by the food supplier
- Step 5: Consider whether a local public message (risk communication) should be provided
